
70-75% of sexually active men and women will get at least one HPV infection in their lifetime.





Many HPV infections will go away on their own, but others can lead to cancer.

HPV infections are related to:

80% to 90% of anal cancers







and almost ALL cases of cervical cancer

Most of these cancers are related to high-risk HPV types 16 and 18.



Data shows 2 doses of an HPV vaccine provides similar protection to 3 doses, when given before the age of 15.

HPV vaccines are publicly funded for Grades 7-12







Grades 7-12 After Grade 12





Health Canada and the National Advisory Committee on Immunization (NACI) have approved and recommend HPV vaccines.

Canada has a goal of having 90% of 17 year olds fully immunized with HPV vaccines by 2025.
