### 9.2.1 Risk Management Update

The committee reviewed the Risk Management Activity Report as reported to the Ministry of Health for the period up to September 30, 2019. It was noted that compared to the report that was presented in 2017 when risk management was formally introduced at Hastings Prince Edward Public Health (HPEPH) many of the risks have been mitigated. Currently HPEPH only has five (5) risks that are determined to be at a "high risk" level. Management continues to monitor, report and implement action to mitigate risks on an ongoing basis.

### 9.2.2 Policy Advocacy Framework

The committee reviewed the Policy Advocacy Framework as presented by Foundational Standards Manager, Veronica Montgomery. The Advancing Public Policy: A Framework for Public Health Action provides guidance on how to plan, document, monitor, and evaluate HPEPH policy-related efforts. It details the role of public health units in policy advocacy, outlines the Policy Process Model, summarizes the Model for Policy Advocacy in Public Health, and supplies various options for Policy Advocacy. As policy advocacy is a core function of public health, the framework will provide HPEPH staff and members of the Board of Health with guiding principles to meaningfully operationalize policy advocacy in a strategic and coordinated fashion.

The Governance Committee recommends the BOH approve the Advancing Public Policy: A Framework for Public Health Action and resolve that staff develop a related BOH policy for advancing public policy at HPEPH.

### 9.2.3 PH Modernization Consultation Process

A recap of the modernization process was given highlighting key dates and next steps within the process. The Governance Committee reviewed and provided suggestions for recommendations for the modernization of Public Health to be presented to the Ministry-appointed expert during the consultation process. Additionally, the BOH provided feedback and next steps in reference to the recommendations for a Board governance model and suggested boundaries.

The Governance Committee recommends that the BOH endorses the consultation document and that the Executive continues to develop recommendations in advance of the consultation process.

### 10. REPORT OF THE MOH and CEO

Dr. Oglaza welcomed Public Health and Preventative Medicine residents, Dr. Azim Kasmani and Dr. Richard Mather to HPEPH.

October 21-25 is National Cervical Cancer Awareness Week. Pap tests are a very effective way to screen for cervical cancers and HPV and allow for prompt treatment if required. The Cancer Centre of Southeastern Ontario (CCSEO) and HPEPH are encouraging people with a cervix to stay up-to-date with Pap tests every three years. Locally, many may have challenges accessing these tests, especially if they do not have a primary care provider. To help improve access to this important test, CCSEO and HPEPH, in partnership with Queen's University Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology, will be offering a Pap Party in Bancroft on October 21, from 5:30pm – 7:30pm. Other local Pap Parties will be held on the same week in Belleville, Tyendinaga, Napanee, and Kingston.

HPEPH will once again be offering flu immunization clinics throughout the community this fall. Dr. Oglaza reinforced that the flu vaccine is the best way to protect yourself and those you care about from the flu. The flu vaccine is available at no cost to any person over the age of 6 months who lives, works, or attends school in Ontario. The vaccine is especially important if you are over 65, pregnant, or live with an immunodeficiency. It is also important for people who live with or take care of these vulnerable individuals. In Ontario, there are many locations where people can receive the vaccination, including their primary care provider, pharmacies, and HPEPH Community Flu Clinics. The vaccine takes up to two weeks to offer full protection, therefore people are encouraged to get vaccinated as early as possible.

Dr. Oglaza discussed health concerns related to vaping, noting that recent events have challenged the common misconception that vaping is harmless. While vaping is being promoted as less harmful than smoking, less harmful does not equal safe. Recently, vaping-related lung illnesses have emerged, with at least one case being identified in Ontario. The Minister of Health recently

implemented Section 77.7.1 of the Health Protection and Promotion Act, requiring hospitals to share data related to cases of vaping-related illness. With this data, Public Health can better understand how and why vaping products may affect the lungs and determine how to best prevent these avoidable illnesses. Dr. Oglaza reinforced that while we are waiting for more information, we continue to share the message that if you don't smoke or vape, don't start. Discussion ensued.

# 11.1 Postpartum Support Enhancement Literature Review, Brooke Cousins and Sandy Stevenson

Brooke and Sandy highlighted that high local rates of perinatal mood disorders and low breastfeeding rates have been identified as public health concerns in Hastings and Prince Edward Counties (HPEC).

Breastmilk provides infants with optimal nutrition for healthy growth and brain development. Breastfeeding also promotes maternal-infant bonding, protects infants from many infections and illnesses, helps build healthy eating habits, and decreases the risk of sudden infant death syndrome. Research has demonstrated the effects of postpartum mood disorders on the initiation and duration of breastfeeding. Mothers with postpartum anxiety are less likely to exclusively breastfeed and are more likely to stop breastfeeding early. Similarly, women with postpartum depression have been found to have decreased breastfeeding duration and increased breastfeeding difficulties.

A comprehensive review of existing research and several recommendations have been developed for postpartum support. Work is underway to determine what recommendations are most feasible for implementation and are most likely to improve postpartum mental health outcomes and breastfeeding rates in HPEC.

### 11.1.2 School Health Situational Assessment, Sharon Osterhout

Sharon detailed that HPEPH has been working to implement the School Health Standard, a new component of the Ontario Public Health Standards. To support this goal, HPEPH's Strategic Plan 2019-2023 identified the need to review and assess the role of public health in local schools.

A comprehensive situational assessment took place over the 2018/2019 school year to help identify how public health can work with schools as they support the health and wellbeing of their students. This assessment took place in partnership with Algonquin Lakeshore Catholic District School Board, Hastings Prince Edward Public School Board, and a consultant. Through surveys, interviews, and focus groups, the assessment results identified key areas of priority for local school boards and schools, which included Positive Mental Health, Healthy Eating Behaviours and Food Safety, Physical Activity and Sedentary Behaviour, and Healthy Growth and Development/Healthy Sexuality.

The Positive Mental Health priority includes Mental Health Promotion, Violence and Bullying, Substance Use and Harm Reduction, and Suicide Risk and Prevention. The report that resulted from the assessment identified ways that public health can partner with the educational sector and the broader community, including municipalities, to implement these recommendations and provide meaningful support to schools and students.

# 10. REPORT OF THE MOH and CEO

Dr. Oglaza gave an update on Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) which are traumatic events that take place during the first 18 years of life. It was suggested that we investigate work taking place across the province to address ACEs. To address this issue, we have partnered with Public Health Ontario and other public health units to establish an ACEs working group that will work to identify what interventions are currently offered by public health units to prevent and/or mitigate the

impact of ACEs and what work is currently underway in Ontario. Once this work is complete, the working group will summarize findings in a report that will be shared with all Ontario health units. This report will help inform future planning for the Healthy Growth and Development Program here at HPEPH and potentially at other public health units.

Dr. Oglaza discussed a new radon study being conducted by HPEPH to better understand radon levels in our area with a view to equipping residents with the information they need to protect themselves. Radon is the second highest cause of both lung cancer and environmental cancer and is more likely to impact one's health when combined with smoking. Homeowners can apply to participate in the study by registering to receive a free radon kit on our website until November 14.

Dr. Oglaza gave an update about a situational assessment conducted with input from local partners to better understand the local impact of opioids and other drugs within our area. This assessment involved gathering and compiling data from sources such as local rates of hospitalization and emergency department visits, interviews with local community service agencies and conducting focus groups of people with lived-experience. A final report identifies recommendations to address the way we approach the opioid crisis locally and can be found on the HPEPH website.

The Healthy Communities team is undertaking a Community Food Assessment in partnership with local agencies, which will involve engagement with the community to identify priorities that need to be addressed and how public health can contribute and to identify strategies for collaboration and partnership between HPEPH and local food system stakeholders. There will be open houses held in Picton, Marmora and Maynooth on November 18 and 19 and an online survey will be offered to the public for all to participate in. The focus of this assessment will be rural communities, where data shows there are greater challenges related to food distribution and access. This assessment will be used to guide decisions and make policy recommendations as we work with our municipal partners. The final report is expected to be completed by March 2020.

# 11.1 Prenatal Education Health Equity Impact Assessment (HEIA) – Wia Baker and Kirsten Stones

A HEIA means reviewing the way we deliver our services to ensure these services are reaching those who need them most. We want to ensure that all expectant families have equitable access to prenatal education. In Hastings and Prince Edward Counties (HPEC) we have approximately 1500 births per year with an average age of 28.5 years of mothers with 30% of these new moms indicating mental health concerns. Discussion ensued.

### 11.1.2 Influenza Update – Bill Sherlock and Dr. Azim Kasmani

HPEPH continues to offer community flu clinics throughout our region and at our offices, provide ongoing education to local health care providers and raise awareness about ways to prevent the flu. So far this year we have had three (3) flu clinics resulting in 945 shots, compared to 2018 where we had given approximately half that number. Over the duration of the flu season we see approximately 1,500 people in the community flu clinics, 2,000 overall by HPEPH and about 15,000 people are seen at pharmacies. Those most affected by the flu continue to be 65 years and over and 0 to 4 years of age.

# 11.1.3 Quinte Region Traffic Coalition Engineering Situational Assessment – Kerri Jianopoulos, Sergeant Stitt and Staff Sergeant Ferguson

The Quinte Region Traffic Coalition (QRTC) recently undertook a situational assessment to identify what is currently being done at the municipal engineering and planning level to address motor vehicle collisions and to identify how we can support and collaborate with municipalities on this serious public health concern. Sergeant Stitt, who is in a lead role and has been involved for over 10 years, noted that the focus has been on enforcement commented, "We can't ticket our way out of this. We need to engage with municipal partners." The QRTC is launching a new campaign consisting of a series of 12 educational videos that will be posted on social media and will be shared with the municipalities to post on their websites and social media platforms as requested by members of the Board.

# HASTINGS PRINCE EDWARD PUBLIC HEALTH 2020 BUDGET- Executive Summary For Board Approval February 5, 2020

After a year of uncertainty and proposed changes to the entire Public Health system in Ontario, the HPEPH Management Team is pleased to present a balanced budget to the Board of Health for the 2020 operating year. The development of this budget has been highly influenced by the directions of the 2019-2023 Strategic Plan which identified priority action items of continuing to review and evaluate our programs and services, establishing processes to improve efficiencies, and optimizing the allocation of resources. These actions will help prepare HPEPH for the modernization of public health that we expect to unfold in the coming months and years. We are continuing work that was already underway, to ensure our staff resources are best aligned to meet organizational needs, while continuing to provide community services.

### The 2020 budget reflects the following key changes in revenue:

- A change in the provincial/municipal cost sharing model from a 75/25% formula to a 70/30% formula for all programs including those that were previously 100% funded by the province. This change results in a \$1,120,050 increase to the municipal contribution.
- The Province of Ontario has indicated mitigation funding will be provided to limit the municipal increase to 10% over 2019. Mitigation funding is expected to be \$837,570 leaving a balance of \$282,480 to be paid by municipalities. For the 2020 fiscal year, this will be drawn from the HPEPH operating reserves to lessen the immediate strain on municipalities and to allow more time for Public Health to receive clarity from the province about future funding.
- The 2020 budget will also account for year 2 of the 2-year adjustment plan to align municipal funding contributions with Statistics Canada population numbers. No further adjustments will be required.
- The Province of Ontario is providing 100% funding for the New Seniors Dental Program which amounts to \$931,300 for HPEPH. In addition, one-time funds for capital investments related to this program have been approved in the amount of \$847,900 to cover the cost of a mobile clinic as well as a full dental lab for the Belleville office.

### The 2020 budget reflects the following key changes in expenditures:

- Changes and adjustments to the HPEPH staff complement have been implemented over the past year as part of efforts to ensure our staff resources align with organizational needs. Staffing changes resulted in an overall decrease of 3 Full-Time Equivalent positions. This change will help accommodate the cost of negotiated increases, increases in benefit costs, as well as provision for outstanding pay equity and job evaluation initiatives.
- > The cost of employee benefits increased by 15% for health and dental.
- A significant increase in our training budget has been planned to support investment in our staff capacity and leadership skills.
- Significant increases in program materials, professional and purchased services and travel costs, as required to implement the new Seniors Dental Program.
- Planned provision for capital expenditures in the amount of \$847,900 for the Seniors Dental program.

Moving forward, the Management Team at HPEPH will continue ongoing work to ensure that our resources meet community public health priorities by actioning the 2019-2023 Strategic Plan, as approved by the Board of Health. Throughout 2020, we will continue to work closely with the Board of Health to respond to the modernization process, and plan proactively for future budgets.

### HASTINGS PRINCE EDWARD PUBLIC HEALTH 2020 BUDGET - Explanatory Notes and Variance Analysis - EXPENSES For Board Approval February 5, 2020

### 1. SALARIES & WAGES

During 2019, HPEPH experienced a high level of staffing changes with a total of 18 new staff joining the organization, multiple internal changes, 8 retirements and 6 leaves of absence. As noted in the Executive Summary, several staffing changes were implemented to address strategic priorities and optimize the allocation of resources.

Decreases in staff positions throughout 2019 included a Senior Public Health Inspector, Health Promoter, Registered Nurse, Dietitian, and Administrative Assistant. Staffing was increased for Dental Hygienists and Dental Assistants to meet the needs of the Seniors Dental Program and additional nursing and Public Health Inspector time was budgeted to cover planned leaves of absence. Additional staff time budgeted in 2019 for communications and IT support has continued in the 2020 budget.

The number of full-time equivalent positions has been reduced from 133 in 2019 to 130 FTEs in 2020. This reduction has allowed us to cover the negotiated increase of 1.75% in 2020 and provides a provision for outstanding pay equity and job evaluation initiatives.

It is important to note that several positions were held vacant during the 2019 year due to the uncertainty of the budget changes announced in the spring. As more details became available, positions were filled to align with service delivery needs. These delays, plus the high level of staff changes during the year resulted in significant salary savings and the resulting 2019 variance on salaries and wages.

### 2. EMPLOYEE BENEFITS

Employee benefits were under budget in 2019 due to position vacancies. Effective December 1, 2019, health and dental rates increased 15% resulting in a substantial increase in benefit costs. Overall, benefits amount to 26% of salaries. This includes statutory benefits (CPP, EI, EHT and WSIB), OMERS pension plan contributions, group health, dental and life insurance and a % in lieu for part-time and contract staff.

### 3. STAFF TRAINING

Staff turnover resulted in savings in the 2019 training budget. The budget for 2020 reflects a strategic direction to invest significantly in the training and development of our staff. A comprehensive leadership and capacity building training course has been budgeted as well as significant increases in many program budgets for training given the large number of new staff.

### 4. TRAVEL EXPENSES

Travel expenses account for staff travel throughout Hastings and Prince Edward Counties to deliver services including the inspection of food and water premises, immunization and dental clinics in the community and home visits . The increase in this area is due to the new requirement to maintain the Mobile Dental Clinic for the Seniors Dental Program. Without the Seniors Dental program, budgeted travel is consistent with 2019 travel costs which were underbudget.

### 5. BUILDING OCCUPANCY

Building occupancy expenses include the building loan, leases, maintenance costs, cleaning services and supplies for all locations of the organization. Building Occupancy costs were overbudget in 2019 due to \$56,000 related to the new Seniors Dental Program, as well as installation of a water softener and treatment system and upgraded flooring in the stairwells. The \$6,000 increase in the 2020 budget allows a provision for the pattern of high maintenance costs.

### 6. OFFICE EXPENSES, PRINTING, POSTAGE

Office expenses were over budget in 2019 due to a large file scanning project, which was completed in December. For 2020, we foresee no significant changes.

### 7. PROGRAM MATERIALS, SUPPLIES

Program materials and supplies were overbudget in 2019 due to significant expenditures for supplies in the new Seniors Dental Program as well as increased expenditures for program materials including nicotine replacement therapy (NRT) and vaccines. For 2020, the budget includes \$222,000 for the Seniors Dental Program which explains the increase in this area.

### 8. PROFESSIONAL & PURCHASED SERVICES

The budget for professional and purchased services was increased substantially for 2020 to reflect the needs of the Seniors Dental program. Dentist fees, denturist and lab fees and other related costs for the program are budgeted at \$410,000. Insurance costs have increased substantially due to an overall increase of 8% and the addition of Cyber insurance to the portfolio for an overall increase of \$16,000. Other budget increases include additional physician fees, a security audit and IT consulting fees.

### 9. COMMUNICATION COSTS

The communication budget for 2020 has been increased to cover the cost of public WIFI at the Belleville site as well as improved internet access at the Bancroft site in 2020.

### **10. INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY**

Information Technology costs were overbudget in 2019 due to the replacement of all zero clients throughout the organization and investment in an additional server to address the needs of the Seniors Dental Program. For 2020, the budget approach has been changed to include a provision of \$55,000 for hardware replacements in the budget to ensure that funds are available for replacements and upgrades as required. This is increasingly important to ensure the security of assets and information.

### **11. ONE-TIME CAPITAL EXPENDITURES**

In 2019, a grant of \$10,100 was received for the replacement of two vaccine refrigerators of which \$8,912 was spent. In 2020, the budget reflects one-time expenses to construct a full dental lab at Belleville and purchase a mobile dental clinic.

### **12. TRANSFER TO CAPITAL/OPERATING FUNDS**

Transfers represent retainable funds that will be held for future building and/or critical service requirements as per the Accounting Practices policy. Ongoing investment in these funds helps ensure continuity of service and availability of funds for future capital costs.

This is to advise you that at the Council Meeting of December 9, 2019, the following resolution was approved.

"WHEREAS, public health care consistently ranks as the top priority in public opinion polls; and,

WHEREAS, Public Health provides vital health promotion and prevention services based on the unique demographic and economic, social, and cultural needs of our communities; and,

WHEREAS, the evidence from hospital amalgamation in Ontario and across Canada is that they have cost billions of dollars and have not yielded the promised administrative savings but have taken money away from frontline care; and,

WHEREAS, there is no evidence to support the proposed closure of 25 out of 35 local Public Health Units, the closure of 12 of 22 local ambulance dispatch centres, and the closure of 49 out of 59 local ambulance services; and, WHEREAS there is a deep consensus among virtually all stakeholders that increasing acuity in our long-term care homes requires additional staff and resources, not cancellation of the two special funds and real dollar cuts to per diem funding of our long-term care homes; and,

WHEREAS our local hospitals have been downsized for an entire generation and cannot meet population needs while sustaining real dollar cuts to hospital global budgets

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

THAT The Corporation of the City of Belleville calls upon the Ontario government to halt the closures of, mergers of, and cuts to our local health care services including Public Health Units, land ambulance services, hospitals and long-term care homes; and,

THAT this motion be circulated to Ontario Premier, Doug Ford; Todd Smith, MPP Prince Edward-Hastings; Daryl Kramp, MPP Hastings – Lennox & Addington and the Association of Municipalities of Ontario."
